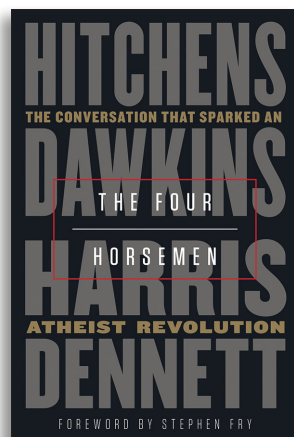
In Jerusalem
