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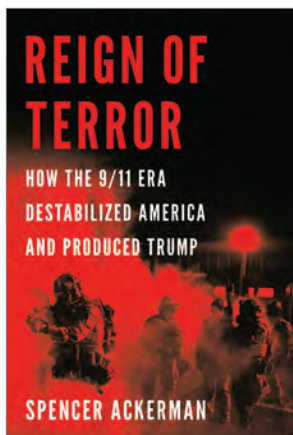
The Cruelty Is the Point

A small group of historians, political leaders, and novelists promoted a history that attempted to transcend and erase the differences and tensions between the nation’s regional cultures. This emerging nationalist story was immediately and powerfully contested by those who argued that the United States was an ethno-state, the homeland of the allegedly superior “Anglo-Saxon” race.
