Drawing on written sources, archaeological evidence, art, and oral storytelling, *Reclaiming Two-Spirits* spans the centuries from Spanish invasion to the present, tracing massacres and inquisitions and revealing how the authors of colonialism's written archives used language to both denigrate and erase Two-Spirit people from history.
